## The correct answer for previous Photo Quiz (Vol 27, No 3, July, 2008)

## The right answer is: (4) Internal and external fistulae are common.

This photograph is showing an operative specimen of a patient who had total proctocolectomy for ulcerative colitis. This disease starts distally in the rectum and can proceed proximally to different levels of the colon. It can predispose to colorectal cancer. The pathological whole mark of the disease is crypt inflammation and crypt abscess. Although only 20-30% of patients will require surgery, yet surgery is curative in those patients. Fistulae are not common in this disease because it is a pure mucosal disease. Consequently, the disease does not reach the serosa and it does not affect nearby organs to cause fistulae.
